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"Why Don't They Just Leave?"

Many times, I have heard people ask the question, "Why don't they just leave?" when referring to an abuse victim. This question holds a lack of understanding of the term domestic violence. Once we understand the complexities of domestic violence, we can begin to respond to abuse, by supporting victims, rather than questioning them in the midst of a path they did not sign up for and they never dreamed they would walk.

Unless you have walked in their

shoes, lived with the shame and guilt of secrecy, do not judge them. You have no idea what they have gone through. You have no idea what they are up against. Unless you have felt the blows to your flesh, the piercing to your heart, or the sting of the hurtful words, do not judge them. You have no idea how they got there, how trapped they feel, or how desperately they want out. Stop asking why they stay. It would not even make sense to you if you knew. Instead of judging, help them. Offer a smile, give encouragement, listen in silence, and let them know you are there when they are ready. They do not need your judgment, but they do need your support. They do not need your pity, they need your prayers and a safe place to fall. Make their emotional and physical safety your priority, not the status of the relationship. The most dangerous time in an abusive relationship is the moment, that the victim leaves. Support them whether or not they choose to leave or to stay. Victims often leave an abuser six to seven times, before they leave for the final time. Remember that the abuser is already pressuring them to do what they want them to do. They do not need added pressure from family and friends also. (continued on page 6.)

- Unequal economically

Abusive

Abuse is occurring in a relationship when one partner is:

- Communicating in a hurtful or threatening way
- Mistreating
- Accusing the other of cheating when it's untrue
- Denying their actions are abusive
- Controlling
- Isolating their partner from others



reasons victims stay in an abusive relationship include fear of losing custody of their children and the fear of what will happen if they leave. They often believe that the violence is temporary, that things will change, that they can stop the violence, or that divorce is wrong. They can have guilt about failure of the relationship, feelings of personal incompetence, lack of resources, and lack of social or family support. They may also not believe, that they are not in an abusive relationship. They have found ways to explain away the incidents in order to remain in the relationship. Unfortunately, many women make substantially less than men and therefore, may have limited resources to support themselves. The abuser may control access to money by restricting the ability to work, or access to credit cards and bank accounts. Without any good options, sometimes it is safer to maintain the status quo than to take a risk and maybe risk your life. Staying may be the only option or the safest decision to make. Do not judge, just be there to help.
